



Our First Year

Humble Beginnings

When I first took the bench in 2009. I started hearing from other judges across the state about the success of relief nurseries in their counties. I learned the program helps stop the cycle of child abuse and neglect through therapeutic services to struggling families. So in 2010, I, along with other First Federal Yamhill County professionals who work with vulnerable children, started asking how we could bring a relief nursery to Ted Crawford, Mayor the children of Yamhill County.

Through the months and years that followed we spent Saturday mornings in each other's living rooms, gathering information and insight into the needs that our local families in crisis faced and planning on how we could create a relief nursery to serve our children under age five – the age range that represented 44% of local child abuse victims.

For the next two years our grassroots group worked closely with local organizations serving young families to learn what programs already existed and how the relief nursery model could compliment and coordinate those services.

Eventually we determined the relief nursery would open as a program of Lutheran Community Services Northwest's Yamhill County office, allowing us to utilize administrative staff already in place and incorporate parenting classes they offered county-wide. LCSNW took over the contract for Healthy Families of Yamhill County, which up until then had been administered by the county and work was done to develop a single referral form for families with children under age five seeking support (taking the burden of understanding different programs off the families themselves) before we felt ready to open our doors last year.

The relief nursery model treats families with dignity and respect, recognizing that abuse and neglect are frequently

the result of extreme stress or a lack of good information. Relief nursery services are designed to stabilize families before stress and trauma have a long-term impact on the development of children in the home and have been proven to reduce foster placements. Children from at-risk families who are enrolled in a relief nursery are more likely to enter the school system ready to learn, grow and become productive community citizens in the years to come.

As we mark the one-year anniversary of A Family Place, I would like to thank each of you for the support you have offered to these families and for the future you have given to their children.



What do you know about being a parent?

This question starts the relationship between our Healthy Families home visitation team and a mother seeking effective ways to interact with her child. It allows the home visitor to develop a sense of how a mother was parented, what expectations she brings to parenting and allows them to develop realistic goals for each step of a child's development.

Lindsay (name has been changed for privacy) was born while her mother was still in high school. Acknowledging the difficulties she faced, her mom enrolled in our Healthy Families home visitation program and started meeting weekly with a member of our team.

The home visitor encouraged Lindsay's mom in her new role as a mother and helped her set expectations based on



Despite the setbacks, however, Lindsay's mom maintained her relationship with Healthy Families and the girls are back with their mother. Their home visitor now meets with them monthly, encouraging their mother and helping her identify positive things about each of the girls; with this encouragement, Lindsay's mom has completed her GED and has enrolled in Chemeketa for the winter term.

When our relief nursery opened in October, Lindsay was one of the first on the list. Twice a week she spends three hours with staff members trained to reduce the impact of stress on her development. Meanwhile, Lindsay's mom can use the time to connect with Lindsay's baby sister, practicing attachment and bonding techniques she learns from her ongoing work with her home visitor.

A Family Place is wrapping around Lindsay, her mother and her sister to encourage them through the difficult times, focus on the positive and empower them to be a great family - and great members of our community.

what is a home visit?

During home visits families receive information and support from an understanding, professional visitor who will help develop skills so parents can:

- Cope better with parenting challenges
- Care for their child's mental and physical health
- Understand how babies grow, develop and learn
- Keep their baby and themselves healthy
- Help their baby be ready for school

Families can enroll during pregnancy, up until the child is 3 months old; home visitors will work with families, as needed, up to three years.

Relief Mursery Classroom Served 19 two and three-year-old children

Andy, a member of our inaugural relief nursery class, was living in a local substance abuse recovery shelter with his dad when he started coming to the nursery. After a few months Andy's mother and younger sister were able to join them and their family was together again, but living in a single room.

In addition to the classroom time Andy's teacher, Aimee, also visited their home monthly to provide guidance on how to respond to the children's behaviors and coach both parents through sibling interactions. During home visits Aimee noticed how serious Andy's dad was about understanding and implementing the parenting techniques she shared each month and learned he was using Andy's classroom time to seek out a better housing arrangement.

Today, when Andy leaves the classroom he goes home to a three-bedroom apartment his dad secured for their family. With a permanent address, his parents now spend Andy's classroom time looking for work near the apartment. The scheduled time each week, combined with monthly accountability through home visits, has helped the family outline and execute a plan for returning to work and lavs one more brick in a stable

foundation for their children.

> for hosting Parent Education Classes

Angela enrolled in our Mothers & Babies class during fall 2013 after the birth of her third daughter. Only then did she begin to realize the troubling thoughts she had experienced with her second child had been a result of postpartum depression. By the time she had sought help, it had been too late and her second child had been removed from her home. Her new baby was another chance and she was determined to do it right. During the 12-week class Angela developed meaningful relationships with other participants and was able to gain perspective and understanding on how to monitor her moods and keep them from having a negative impact on her daughter.

By the time the relief nursery opened, Angela understood the importance of taking time for herself and enrolled her daughter, who continues today as part of our three-vear-olds class.

More than 15% of mothers will experience postpartum depression, which is one of the top three risk factors for child abuse.

parent education classes

Mothers & Babies

For women who are pregnant and/or have children under the age of 3 and have been feeling sad, isolated, lonely, anxious, and/or have problems sleeping. This 12-week class helps identify if they are experiencing Ante/Postpartum Depression, and develops skills for coping and seeking help. The course will cover topics including taking care of yourself, finding emotional support and emotional attachment.

Make Parenting a Pleasure

This 8-week class helps all parents identify ways to take better care of themselves and discover new ways to make parenting easier. Parents are encouraged to connect with each other and develop strategies together to better understand their child's behavior and ways to discipline that fit their child's age.

Circle of Security

The Circle of Security is a relationship based early intervention program designed to enhance attachment security between parents and children. Decades of university-based research have confirmed that secure children exhibit increased empathy, greater self-esteem, better relationships with parents and peers, enhanced school readiness, and an increased capacity to handle emotions more effectively when compared with children who are not secure.

Most classes are offered in both English & Spanish.

who needs a change?

Parents, children and our community all experience positive change when we increase access to diapers for local families.

- 1 in 3 moms report they do not have an adequate supply of diapers
- The stress a parent or caregiver feels when they are not able to meet their children's basic needs adds to the already difficult task of parenting and can have a negative impact on their baby.
- Families unable to afford an adequate supply of clean diapers often leave their babies in a single diaper all day, which causes stress to the child and can have a negative emotional affect.
- Children without an adequate diaper supply are often unable to enroll in early childhood classrooms or daycares that require a family to supply diapers, thus reducing a parent's ability to work.

Organizations across Yamhill County have been hosting diaper drives to stock our diaper banks and ensure emergency supplies of diapers are available to local families.

Known as *vicarious trauma* within the social services field, it's the stress employees often feel when they see children and families experiencing crisis day after day. Michelle, who holds a Masters in Social Work and a certificate in trauma-informed services, spends much of her time with staff members, helping brainstorm creative suggestions unique to the situations their families are facing. Her fluency in English and Spanish also allows her to work directly with families when needed.

Next Steps

Over the next year we will work to develop a client outreach team to connect with families on our waiting-list. This team will monitor risk factors for abuse and neglect and prioritize which families will fill program slots when they become available.

Add a relief nursery classroom for infants within two years.

Open a relief nursery classroom at Joyful Servant Lutheran Church in early 2015.

Add two more classes in 1-2 years, serving infants through 3 year-olds.

West Valley

Increase Parent Education opportunities.

Start distributing diapers at already existing community events.

Develop long-term timeline for establishing a relief nursery classroom space.
